## Pigeon (Rock Dove)

Brought from Europe to North America in the early 1600's by French colonists, as a source of food.

## Common Starling

Brought from Europe to North America by a wealthy German immigrant, Eugene Schieffelin in the late 1800's, apparently because it is mentioned in Shakespeare's play Henry IV, part 1.

#### House Sparrow

Also brought from Europe in the 1800's, with the hope that it would reduce agricultural pests.
